Election Security Hearing Scheduled

On the afterneon of April 18 in Miami, the EAC's will hold a public hearing focused on election security and exclusively featuring testimony from state and local election officials. Election officials gathered in Miami for the EAC's Standards Board meeting, as well as other election administrators in attendance will have the opportunity to provide comments about their plans ahead of election day, concerns about cyber or other security matters, or other related topics. Members of the general public are invited to submit written testimony, but will not have the opportunity to provide oral testimony.



- Can funds be distributed if the EAC does not have a Commissioner quorum?


