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# Language Access Coverage in California (November 2016)

- 56 of 58 CA counties had language access requirements under either federal or state law
- English, Spanish, 8 Asian languages
- Coverage under federal law:
  - 27 counties w/ Spanish
  - 8 w/ at least one Asian language
- Coverage under state law:
  - 50 counties





# Need for Language Assistance During Elections

	CA Latinos	CA Asian Americans
Speak a language other than English at home	77%	72%
Limited English proficient (LEP)	37%	34%

# 1. Community Education and Outreach

# Community Education and Outreach

Worked with 20 community partner organizations:

- 1. Distributed Know Your Voting Rights materials AAAJ-CA produced in 13 languages.
- 2. Hosted community workshops for first-time voters and LEP voters.
- 3. Consulted with elections officials about outreach, bilingual poll workers recruitment, etc.
- 4. Recruited bilingual poll workers and poll monitors.

# Community Education and Outreach

## Tips for approaching community organizations:

- Cultural and linguistic competency.
- Meet people where they are.
- Try to address specific needs of that community.
  - Example: Filipino community (lack of language need, "Filipino" vs. "Tagalog")
  - Example: Punjabi community in Central CA
- Offer value.
  - –Sometimes that means financial!



# 2. Meetings with Elections Officials & Advocacy for Best Practices

# Meetings with Elections Officials & Advocacy for Best Practices

Met w/ elex officials in each county at least once.

- Brought long list of questions about details of compliance with language access requirements.
- Nudged where necessary.
- Gathered best practices from elections officials; acted as hub of a wheel.
- Created best practices package, multiple webinars, etc.

# Meetings with Elections Officials & Advocacy for Best Practices

Addressing noncompliance – poll worker trainings

- Most Section 203 noncompliance in CA is poll worker-generated
- Asked to see poll worker training docs, attended poll worker trainings in 12+ counties
- Suggested additional emphasis where necessary, pointed to past data to be more persuasive

# Meetings with Elections Officials & Advocacy for Best Practices

## Addressing noncompliance - possibility of litigation

- Contemplated legal action against county that failed language access requirements in June 2016
- Wrote letter documenting failures
- Laid out actions they should take
- Laid out ways we could support
- "We know you share our goal of elections that are fully accessible to all language communities. The collaboration we propose here can help us achieve that goal while also avoiding litigation that could otherwise be used to enforce the law in this area."
