Background and Overview

In 2019, Colorado passed a new piece of legislation, the Colorado Votes Act, which created important changes to the Colorado Election Model. A key change was granting 17-year-olds the right to vote in a primary election if they turned 18-years-old by the following General Election. For 2020, this allowed many 17-year-olds to participate in two primary elections – the March Presidential Primary and the June Statewide Primary.

In response to this new opportunity, Boulder County Elections developed a High School Voter Registration Program. This program created a "Student Voter Registration Awareness Week" and sought to identify a voter registration liaison at each public high school in the county. We then leveraged the connections with these liaisons to amplify and implement additional voter outreach and education efforts within the schools. Alongside the liaison outreach, we worked countywide to educate our community about this new opportunity to participate in our democracy and to prepare our newly enfranchised youth to vote.

The Challenge: Lack of awareness of the new law

Our Elections Division prides itself on our voter education and outreach efforts. During the 2019 Coordinated Election, we hosted several community presentations in which we highlighted many of the changes instituted by the Colorado Votes Act, including the provision allowing 17-year-olds to vote in primaries. During our dialogue with community members at these informal presentations, we discovered that many of our constituents, including educators, parents of teenagers, and teens themselves, were unaware of this new provision.

After the conclusion of the 2019 November election, and with the Colorado presidential primary only three months away, we knew we had to act fast to ensure everyone in our community was aware of the change – in particular, our students and parents. Our staff felt strongly that we needed to ensure that every newly eligible 17-year-old had the information necessary to participate in the upcoming primaries, so we developed a strategy to fill the existing educational gap.

Our Approach


With a short timeline to raise awareness, we knew we had to target students directly. However, our budget would not permit us to conduct a full-fledged advertising campaign targeting youth. We needed partners and what better partners than the schools themselves? Reaching students through their teachers and peers would provide us with

an unparalleled opportunity to engage these young voters in a way we otherwise could not.

With our target audience set, we knew that we needed to put together a program and materials that were easy to understand and implement due to the busy and demanding lives of teachers, school staff, and the students themselves. We also wanted these materials to speak directly to young people, so we created a tailored brand that was complementary to our Boulder County Elections brand, but a more "youthful" version of it.

Our first step was to obtain leadership buy-in from our two local school districts. While we expected them to be generally supportive, we knew that establishing





meaningful connections at schools would be challenging on short notice without a mandate from the district. In order to provide the districts with an easy opportunity to publicly back our efforts, we proposed the creation of a "Student Voter Registration Awareness Week." Our office drafted a formal resolution designating February 3-7, 2020 as the awareness week and asked both school district boards to officially sign on to help educate youth in Boulder County about the new law. This proclamation served two purposes: it created a buzz in the community that generated increased awareness about the new provision, and it formalized several key commitments from the schools to expedite our engagement with students.

Our office was also able to capitalize on an old provision in state law that required every high school principal to appoint a staff member to help citizens register to vote while on school grounds. While this provision had been in law for years, it was widely overlooked as it lacked any enforcement mechanism. Nor was there much of an incentive for meeting this requirement as most students would not be of age to cast a ballot until after high school prior to the Colorado Votes Act. However, the new provision meant that the vast majority of high school seniors would have the ability to cast their first ballot while still in school.

Voter Registration Liaison Overview





Every Colorado public high school is required by law to designate a staff member to be trained in Voter Registration. Title 1, Article 2, Part 4, 1-2-402 and 1-2-403)



- · Principal appoints a staff person to help citizens register to vote while on school grounds.
- · Person is referred to in statue as a "high school deputy registrar" - in Boulder County, we will refer to this person as a High School Voter Registration Liaison.
- Person is trained in voter registration basics by their county clerk's office (that's this training!)

Being a Liaison is Easy!



- ✓ Main role and responsibility is to help direct students and staff on how best to get registered to vote - whether online or in-person. And return forms, if you collect them.
- You are a source of knowledge first and foremost!
- Registration drives, events, etc. are optional, they are not required - And you can solicit help from an official Voter Reg Drive Org or our office if you would like to do one!

While pre-registration of students as young as 16 existed in Colorado prior to the new law, school administrators and educators now had an overwhelming reason to help their current students register to vote.

After the formal resolutions were adopted by the school districts, it was easy to package our high school voter registration program with the rollout of a Student Voter Registration Awareness Week. Schools were asked to promote voter registration and provide voting information by:

- Designating a "Voter Registration Liaison" who would be trained in voter registration basics and act as an information source for all voter registration and election questions
- Promoting voter registration by making registration accessible and convenient and/or by holding voter registration events
- Displaying registration information posters and flyers provided by **Boulder County Elections**

- Leveraging formal and trusted communication channels for voter registration information – including school emails, loudspeaker announcements, student-run news sources, and classroom presentations
- Inviting Boulder County Elections to present during class or at an assembly

Working in conjunction with the school liaisons, we were also able to connect directly with excited and engaged students who were eager to promote the ability of their peers to register and vote. In addition, we worked with school district communication staff to

draft articles for parent newsletters letting them know about the change in law. We also conducted our normal voter outreach efforts through city newsletter channels, social media, and other outlets to make sure the change in law was highlighted to the adult voting population. We wanted to make sure that parents were aware that their 17-year-old could vote!



Benefits & Results

The efforts we undertook were varied depending on the approach the school and our designated liaison wanted to take, but key highlights included:

- Identifying a voter registration liaison at almost every high school in Boulder County and working with many of them on student outreach efforts
- Being invited as a special guest on Monarch High School's "Coyote TV" to promote the week, which was played throughout the week during morning announcements
- Attending a Voter Registration "Assembly Style" Voter Registration event, where teachers brought their classes to the gymnasium to register to vote
- Distributing voter registration toolkits to every school in Boulder County, which
 included posters, handbills, a link to our 60-second <u>Presidential Primary PSA</u> (to share
 with students/parents), and sample loudspeaker announcements
- Registering hundreds of students to vote, resulting in one of the highest voter turnouts of registered 17-year-olds in the state 61% in Boulder County compared to 43% average statewide.

Vision moving forward

We were thrilled with the results of the program. And while the idea spawned from wanting to ensure these students participated in the two primary elections before the General Election in 2020, we created it with an eye toward it being a long-term, sustainable effort for the schools.

Since students can pre-register to vote in Colorado starting at age 16, we believe this model is flexible enough to be implemented in high schools every single year, regardless of election cycles. We look forward to continuing to support our students and teachers in preparing the next generation of voters to be active participants in our democracy.

PUBLISHED: February 6, 2020 at 5:00 p.m. Monarch High senior Grateful Beckers watched the Democratic presidential candidate debates with interest, but only found out through a campaign at her Louisville school this week that a new law allows her

vote in the primary at 17.

The next day, she registered to vote at a booth set up in Monarch's hall with the help of Colorado Democracy Challenge.

"I'm really excited about it," she said. "This is such an important election. I want to make sure the Democratic candidate is a strong one."

The Boulder Valley and St. Vrain Valley school districts have partnered with Boulder County Elections for the inaugural "Student Voter Registration Awareness Week."

The goal is to educate high school students about upcoming elections — the March 3 presidential primary, the June 30 statewide primary and the Nov. 3 general election.

A recent change in state law allows 17-year-olds who will turn 18 by the Nov. 3 general election to participate in both primaries.

Boulder County Clerk and Recorder Molly Fitzpatrick said she's found many high school seniors don't know about the new law.

"We wanted to support new voters in participating," she said. "We can really create a lot of buzz and momentum and awareness for this new change. These are our democracy's newest voters. Registering and voting can be overwhelming at times. We want to break it down for them."

Boulder County asked schools to promote voter registration by designating a voter registration liaison to serve as an information source, holding voter registration events and displaying posters and fliers provided by the elections division.

"Research shows that, if young people vote in three consecutive elections, they are more likely to be a lifelong voter," Fitzpatrick said. "High school is such a formative part of a young person's life. We want to help the high schools in promoting civic engagement."

Purpose: This page is to provide High School Voter Registration Liaisons and all student voter registration champions (students, parents, and organizations) with a one-stop shop for resources to promote voter registration in Boulder County High Schools

Voter Registration begins in High School

Colorado allows and encourages voter pre-registration beginning at the age of 16. Additional requirements to register include:

- Be a U.S. citizen
- Be a Colorado resident for at least 22 days before the election
- Must not be serving a sentence of confinement or detention for a felony conviction (Note: Those on probation or parole are eligible to vote.)

High School Voter Registration Liaison

Yes, it's true. Colorado election law states that every public high school principal needs to appoint a staff person to help citizens register to vote while on school grounds (this person is referred to in statute as a "high school deputy registrar ""). In Boulder County, we refer to this position as our High School Voter Registration Liaison.

Voter Registration Liaison Training and Documentation

- 1. Attend/watch voter registration training: Voter registration training is complete after an appointed liaison either attends a live webinar (times/dates emailed to schools) or by watching the training online C* (18-minutes).
- 2. Complete this high school voter registration liaison template letter 🔀 designating a Voter Registration Liaison for your high school. The letter must be on high school letterhead and signed by the principal. It can be emailed to:

3. Oath of Office: Contact our office by email or by phone at 303-413-7740 to have the High School Deputy Registrar / Voter Registration Liaison Oath of Office emailed to you and to arrange a time to conduct the oath verbally over the phone or inperson.

Student Voter Registration Week and our #IMaVOTER Program

Due to a recent change in Colorado law, youth who will turn 18-year-olds by November 3, 2020 are now eligible to vote in primary elections this year. This means that the vast majority of Colorado high school seniors can cast ballots in both the March 3

Presidential Primary and the June 30 Statewide Primary.

To help raise awareness of the ability of seniors to vote in March and beyond, Boulder Valley School District and St. Vrain Valley School District both passed resolutions in support of February 3rd – February 7th being "High School Student Voter Registration Awareness Week." The resolutions have been posted here: BVSD Resolution (2) and SVVSD Resolution (3).

Boulder County Elections has also produced posters for our local high schools (links below) with our #IMaVoter High School Voter Registration logo and contact information.

 to mail or drop off themselves.

- Boulder Elections 60-second Presidential Primary Election Ad Show / share / email this short YouTube Ad/PSA [3] to students and their families.
- Ballot processing and election security videos Find additional short (5 minutes or less) educational videos on the Boulder County Clerk & Recorder's YouTube channel. And subscribe to receive alerts when new videos or PSAs are posted.
