U.S. Election Assistance Commission "Clearies" Submission: Outstanding Innovations in Elections

Leveraging SMS short codes to facilitate Voter Information & Empowerment in the time of COVID-19

Introduction

For voters, Election Day is a way to perform their civic duty. For those involved in elections, Election Day marks the long-awaited culmination of tireless efforts to serve and encourage voters to go to the polls. With the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic, traditional methods of community engagement and empowerment were abruptly reduced or eliminated. More than ever, the need to leverage existing technology to engage the electorate was critical. For low-propensity voters, first-time voters, newly Naturalized citizens, or non-native English speakers, the voting process can seem daunting for a normal election. For many, the 2020 Presidential Election was particularly confusing, with voting rules and procedures in a state of constant change.

Montgomery County, Maryland, not only leveraged Zoom, Teams, our newly developed MoCo Votes app and other methods of communicating that served as the new platforms for community engagement during the pandemic, but also made effective use of traditional communications such as direct mail, radio, and television to push voters toward a simple texting short code platform. SMS texting provided County voters with reassuringly simple, straightforward and time sensitive information and service generated hyperlinks.

The Need for Expeditious Implementation

The coronavirus has altered the way many Americans are voting or going to the polls. The shift towards early voting has been going on for years, but the need to vote by mail to mitigate viral exposure has progressed rapidly since this spring's the spring 2020 primaries. Like neighboring states, Montgomery County election administrators via State Emergency Proclamations had to modify established business practices by expanding vote-by-mail resources, consolidating approximately 250 election day precincts into 39 vote centers, modify early voting dates and quickly implementing the installation of 50 ballot drop boxes to supplement USPS community concerns and the surge of voting by mail. More than ever, the need to leverage existing technology to engage the electorate quickly was paramount.

Innovative Uses of Technology

The latest addition to the voter engagement portfolio of the Board of Elections has been the introduction of SMS short code, a partnership with the county's Department of Technology Services. According to the Pew Research Center, on average, American adults send and receive 32 texts per day, totaling 18 billion texts every day, 541 billion texts every month, and 6.5 trillion texts every year (not including children 12 years old and younger). The ability to provide relevant and instantaneous election-focused information is paramount in carrying out County Government's vision towards an "Effective, Sustainable Government". SMS texting provides County voters easy access to information and services without traveling to its main office in Gaithersburg, Maryland, or the need to log into a traditional broadband service at home/work. SMS short codes are a great service tool as they get potential voters to act immediately and improve confidence using familiar technology that is in their hand.

Service in Seconds

Text messaging has proven itself a powerful tool for educating and mobilizing voters. During the 2020 Presidential election cycle, the Montgomery County Board of Elections provided voters a platform to request and/or leverage relevant information within seconds. Additionally, a growing share of County residents now use smartphones as their primary means of online access at home. Today, roughly one in five American adults are "smartphone-only" internet users – meaning they own a smartphone, but do not have traditional home broadband service. With fewer options for online access, many financially restricted County residents are relying more on smartphones. BOE's bilingual SMS short code broadens our reach into the community, the speed in which services are rendered and mitigates common service request made to the office by traditional means such as email and/or calls made to the office. The need to make election information more accessible and to service Montgomery County voters expeditiously via SMS short codes was paramount. As more and more citizens use smart phones to access information, the Board of Elections wanted to find more innovative ways to leverage technology to keep their voters in the loop. The incorporation of SMS short codes broadens the reach to County residents to get voter information out more easily and cheaply. The SMS short codes provide the following services:

The Results/Success of the Program

• Voters adapted quickly to using SMS short codes. The Montgomery County Board of Elections serves fewer than 690,000 registered voters but received over 107,000 requests for information in the 2020 presidential election cycle. The seamless integration of SMS short codes enabled us to share said platform with the Maryland State Board of Elections and neighboring Maryland counties.

- Voters were able to successfully find their vote centers and drop boxes. The presidential primary and general elections went extremely well, with very, very few complaints about difficulty in finding ballot drop boxes or vote centers. This was due in large part to the fact that we made it very easy for voters, candidates, the media, and others who were working to get out the vote to share information, and to equip voters to get information themselves, using the SMS short codes.
- The use of short codes allowed us to provide just-in-time information when voters needed it. Rather than sending voters to a single website to look up information on a cumbersome website or in lengthy FAQs, we were able to direct them to text a simple, easy to remember word to 77788. For example, to check their voter registration, voters were able to text "CHECK" to 77788. To find the nearest drop box, they were able to text "BOX" to 77788. To sign up to serve as a poll worker, they were able to text "SERVE" to 77788. In Spanish, they were able to text "REVISE" or "BUZON" or "SERVIR".
- The program fills gaps in the availability of services and improves the administration of an existing county program. It also enhances the level of citizen participation in and understanding of government programs during the ever-changing election regulation and implementation landscape due to the pandemic.
- The use of separate Spanish language short codes was extremely helpful in communicating to and building trust with many voters in our county. The department has been in compliance with the requirements of Section 203 of the Voting Rights Act since Montgomery County first became subject to the requirements after the 2000 Census. The efforts outlined here are beyond mere compliance with requirements for bilingual translation and display Montgomery County's

creative approach to meeting the needs of a diverse community comprised of voters who speak many languages and have many different needs.
