

Historic recount will have to move quickly

Wisconsin will begin a historic presidential recount next week and the state could risk losing its ability to have its 10 electoral votes counted if it doesn't meet key deadlines next month.

Hitting a Dec. 13 deadline could be particularly tricky if Green Party presidential nominee Jill Stein is able to force the recount to be conducted by hand, Wisconsin's top election official said.

Stein and independent presidential candidate Roque "Rocky" De La Fuente separately filed recount requests late Friday, the last day they were able to do so. Stein received about 31,000 votes and De La Fuente about 1,500 out of 3 million cast.

Communication is Key

WEC staff developed templates for counties to use to provide daily progress reports of what reporting units (precincts) were recounted that day and requested an explanation of a change in the original results which equaled more than 10 votes in a reporting unit.

Litigation

Jill Stein v. Wisconsin Elections Commission, et al. (Case. No. 16CV3060)

On November 28, 2016, Jill Stein filed a lawsuit in Dane County Circuit Court, requesting a hand recount of all ballots cast. Under Wis. Stat. § 5.90(1).

Following a hearing on November 29, 2016, the Court denied Jill Stein's request, which allowed each county board of canvass to choose their method of tabulation for the recount. Jill Stein did not appeal the Court's decision.

Great America PAC, et al., v. Wisconsin Elections Commission, et al. (Case No. 16CV0795)

On Dec. 1, 2016, Great America PAC, Stop Hillary PAC and Ronald R. Johnson lawsuit alleged the recount would be conducted in a manner that violates the requirements set forth in *Bush v. Gore*, 531 U.S. 98 (2000) for recounts in presidential elections.

Additionally, they alleged that the recount could extend beyond the federal “safe harbor” deadline of Dec. 13, 2016. Plaintiff’s sought an emergency temporary restraining order to halt the recount.

Great America PAC, et al., v. Wisconsin Elections Commission, et al. (Case No. 16CV0795)

On Dec. 2, 2016, the motion for an emergency temporary restraining order was denied.

On Dec. 9, 2016, the preliminary injunction motion was also denied. Great America PAC voluntarily dismissed their lawsuit on Dec. 19, 2016


 A federal judge declined to stop Wisconsin's presidential recount Friday, clearing the way for the tally to finish here on Sunday or Monday and to meet a federal deadline.

Recount Findings

Ultimately, the certified results following the recount changed very little from the original results – with Donald Trump gaining 844 votes, Hillary Clinton gaining 713 votes for a net gain of 131 votes for Donald Trump. Jill Stein gained 66 votes.

However, the small net change in votes obscured that there were thousands of both positive and negative swings in the final totals.

At least 9,039 presidential votes weren't counted correctly on Election Night, and only were added to the official results because of the recount, the State Journal review found. Another 2,161 votes were originally counted but later tossed out for reasons including to square vote totals with the number of voters who signed the poll book.

The recount revealed presidential election results — President-elect Donald Trump extended his lead over Democrat Hillary Clinton by 131 votes and total votes increased by about 400 out of nearly 3 million cast. Recount proponents had raised concerns about Russia possibly tampering with election results, but the recount found no evidence to support such claims.

The more than 11,000 changes to the original vote total represent a minor 0.38 percent error rate out of the nearly 3 million votes counted.

Wisconsin's first statewide presidential recount found no major problems with the state's voting system, but it did reveal several errors affecting thousands of ballots that could spur local clerks to tighten procedures, according to a Wisconsin State Journal review.

The recount revealed that the state's presidential election results were not as clear as they seemed. Clinton's lead over Trump was extended his lead in several states, and total votes in several states were not cast. Recount procedures in several states were possibly tampered with, but the Wisconsin State Journal found no evidence of tampering.

The State Journal review found more than 55 percent of the ballots were recounted by hand. The error rate was 0.44 percent in wards that conducted the recount by hand and 0.30 percent in wards that recounted by machine.

The difference in error rate between wards that Trump and Clinton won was negligible — 0.38 percent versus 0.37 percent.

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- (4) If a valid petition for a recount is filed under s. 9.01 in an election at which an electronic voting system was used to record and tally the votes cast, each party to the recount may designate one or more persons who are authorized to receive access to the software components that were used to record and tally the votes in the election. The commission shall grant access to the software components to each designated person if, before receiving access, the person enters into a written agreement with the commission that obligates the person to exercise the highest degree of reasonable care to maintain the confidentiality of all proprietary information to which the person is provided access, unless otherwise permitted in a contract entered into under sub. (5).
