Describe how you used the funds to address the pandemic.

With the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic in the United States, election officials in Nevada began to face challenges related to the availability of poll workers and polling locations for the state's June 9, 2020 Primary Election. To negate these issues, election officials in Nevada decided to conduct a vote-by-mail primary election where registered voters would be automatically sent a mail ballot. However, since less than 10 percent of Nevada voters generally vote by mail in any given election, Nevada election officials knew the preparation, mailing, and processing of 1.8 million ballots would require significant voter education and additional mail ballot processing equipment.

To assist with this, the Secretary of State's office used CARES Act funding to lease ballot-on-demand printers and high-speed scanners for our 17 county election offices in order to facilitate ballot creation during in-person voting and increase the speed of the ballot tabulation process. Each county election official provided a postage prepaid ballot return envelope with each mail ballot so voters would not have to pay for postage to return their mail.

While there was very little in-person voting during the Primary Election, with only 1 polling location open in each county (3 in Clark County), some personal protective equipment (PPE), hand sanitizer, gloves, social distancing items (floor-marking duct tape, signage, etc.) and sneeze guards were purchased by the counties, and reimbursed with CARES funds by the State.

After the Primary Election, the 17 counties anticipated returning to the normal course of business with normal levels of inperson voting both before and on Election Day. In order to support the requirements of a growing number of registered voters, the 17 counties had an increased number of locations to man and support. In the largest county, Clark County, the increase from 3 polling locations to 120+ required hiring additional staff, the cost of which was covered by CARES Act funding. In order to physically prepare for the safety of election workers and voters at all of these locations, approximately \$118,000 were allocated to the purchase of PPE, hand sanitizer, and sneeze guards.

In the Summer of 2020, the Nevada Legislature convened a special session to address COVID-19. During the 32nd Special Legislative Session, the state Legislature passed Assembly Bill 4. Assembly Bill 4 included the mandate to send mail-in ballots to all active registered voters. As this was unique in Nevada history, a voter education campaign was planned and conducted, ultimately costing approximately \$324,000 of CARES Act funding. It was augmented by local county voter education campaigns costing an additional \$335,000 of CARES Act funding. In addition, the Secretary of State's Office sent a postcard to all 1.8 million active registered voters to clarify the changes to the General Election directed in Assembly Bill 4. These campaigns were a vital part of the agency's outreach and greatly increased voter awareness.

All counties incurred much higher print and mailing costs than normal, much of which was paid for with CARES funds in the Primary. However, Assembly Bill 4 granted \$3 million to the counties so very little CARES funding was needed for the general

election's print and mail costs.

Many counties used CARES funds to purchase mechanical letter openers, and/or to hire additional, temporary staff to process the increased amount of mail ballots during both elections.

Clark and Washoe Counties represent 87 percent of the state's active registered voters (70 percent in Clark and 17 percent in Washoe). Because of this, both counties purchased envelope sorters to assist in processing the mail ballots. Clark's was purchased before the Primary and Washoe's was purchased for the General. CARES funds were used to aid in purchasing both these machines.

11. Describe the major issues you faced in dealing with the pandemic in the election cycle.

We addressed the common issues related to the pandemic, such as keeping equipment sanitized and how to fit people into a polling place while still safely socially distancing, but there was also a major obstacle with voters' understanding of how to use a mail-in ballot and how to cure their signature when necessary.

Most voters in Nevada had never voted by mail before the primary election so the Secretary of State's office used CARES Act funding to contract with a marketing group to launch a statewide voter education campaign. This campaign focused on educating voters about how to vote by mail and other changes made to the primary election. The voter education campaign utilized television ads, radio ads, direct mailers and a new website to educate voters about the all-mail primary election and provide instructions on how to correctly complete their mail ballot. Several counties conducted their own voter outreach as well.

Educating voters how to vote using their mail ballot was only half the battle. Since most people had never used a mail ballot, they were also unfamiliar with how to cure their ballot if they were notified by the county clerk that they either failed to sign their return envelope or the signature did not match the one on file. To help make signature cure more convenient and as easy as possible for the public, the Secretary of State's office contracted with Global Mobile to use their Text2Cure electronic signature-curing platform. This allowed voters to cure their signature on their smart phone without having to make a photocopy of their identification and mail it into the county election office.

Since 24 percent of all successful signature cures in the Primary were completed using Global Mobile, this option was utilized during the General Election as well, again with CARES funds.

To help process the increased amount of mail ballots during the Primary and General Elections, almost all counties leased additional voting equipment using CARES funds. A total of \$561,592 was spent to lease additional voting equipment for 16 counties, which included 27 ballot scanners, 26 high-volume ballot printers and 11 election management systems.

CARES funds were also used to purchase additional voting equipment in 4 counties, including 1 high capacity scanner and 33 high-volume ballot printers, totaling \$134,024.74.
