During the CARES Act Grant reporting period, we spent grant funds in accordance to our approved state plan and the HAVA act. The following is a summary of the activities for which funds were expended in this reporting period.

Election Safety Grants

During the reporting period, the Department expended \$2,002,112.68 in CARES Act funds and \$82,166.77 in CARES Act State Match funds to assist counties in acquiring Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) and other related expenses to protect election workers and voters during the pandemic. This equipment allowed voters to safely vote and election officials and workers to mitigate COVID-19 infection risk while conducting three federal elections.

Grants for the Purchase and Installation of Drop-boxes and Associated Materials

During the reporting period, the Department expended \$212,816.39 in CARES Act funds to aid counties in purchasing and installing 24-hour ballot drop boxes. In 2016, Colorado began issuing grants to counties around the state for the purchase and installation of ballot drop boxes. Counties with more than 10,000 active voters were reimbursed up to 80 percent of their costs, while counties with less than 10,000 active voters were reimbursed up to 90 percent of their costs, with a maximum reimbursement of \$10,000.00 per county. Counties could ask for reimbursement for the cost of the purchase, delivery and installation of the drop-box, along with the cost for the purchase, delivery, and installation of equipment needed to keep the box secure, including camera equipment. To date, 53 counties across the state have applied for and received this grant.

These grant funds were used to improve the administration of elections for Federal office in Colorado. In 2013, Colorado began mailing all active voters in the state a ballot. To improve both the speed and safety of returning those ballots, Colorado counties began to place ballot drop-boxes around their communities for voters to use. This grant program encouraged counties either to increase their use of drop boxes. Usage of the drop boxes by voters has continued to increase, and the majority of voters now use it to return their ballots around the state. In 2020, these drop boxes provided a safe means for voters to return their voted ballot securely in three federal elections while maintaining social distance and protecting their health and safety, and that of election workers, during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Additional Election Judge Pay Grants

During the reporting period, the Department expended \$384,317.93 of CARES Act Grant funds to provide additional pay for election judges for the June 30, 2020 Preference Primary and for the November General Election to assist counties in the recruitment of election judges. These funds were provided to the counties to provide adequate compensation for election judges to ensure that counties were able to fill all necessary positions to successfully run each election. These funds enabled counties to recruit additional judges, increase hourly pay, and offer paid sick leave.

Preference Primary Election Mailing Grants

During the reporting period, the Department expended \$491,509.17 of the CARES Act Grant funds and \$327,780.94 of CARES Act State Match funds to provide a one-time assistance in ballot printing, inserting and mailing costs associated with the June 30, 2020 Preference Primary Elections.

Voter Information during Pandemic

During the reporting period, the Department expended \$2,167,785.13 of CARES Act Grant funds and \$730,449.82 of CARES Act Grant State Match funds to provide voters information concerning voter information and impacts of the pandemic. In addition to a general outreach effort to inform voters about voting safely during the COVID-19 pandemic, the Department worked to reach particularly vulnerable populations including homeless voters. The Department also worked to ensure voters on tribal lands had access to information about voting safely during the 2020 elections.

Misinformation/Disinformation

During the reporting period, the Department expended \$114,552.20 in CARES Act Grant funds and \$31,690 in CARES Act State Match funds to combat and prevent foreign misinformation and disinformation from misleading voters in Colorado. We engaged in disseminating accurate information regarding voting as well as monitoring and combatting foreign misinformation and disinformation.

Secure Remote Election Judge Training

During the reporting period, the Department expended \$663,092.78 in CARES Act Grant funds to enable counties provide secure remote training for election judges during the pandemic to ensure that election judges were prepared for the elections, sensitive data was secured, and that we mitigated health risks.

Cybersecurity Protection of Election Systems

During the reporting period, the Department expended \$73,786.83 in CARES Act Grant funds to provide additional cybersecurity protection for our election systems to protect and prevent outside threats from accessing our systems.

County Support to Prepare and Execute Elections

During the reporting period, the Department expended \$63,913.09 in CARES Act State Match funds assisting counties with adapting to the pandemic, preparing for and successfully holding multiple Federal elections occurring during the pandemic.

Additional Capacity for Receiving Secure Ballots

During the reporting period, the Department expended \$70,030.00 in CARES Act Grant funds to expand our office's capabilities to received ballots through our Secure Ballot systems for military and overseas voters.

Overall we were able to get a substantial portion of the grant and match out to the counties to support them during the pandemic as well as increasing our security and capabilities to adapt to the pandemic environment with the compressed timeframe.

Our office faced tight deadlines and difficulties in meeting necessary procurement requirements and busy counties which resulted in delays and extra work for the counties in trying to get additional funds to them to help prepare and execute the Federal elections during the pandemic. In order to resolve these issues, we focused on the pandemic and allocated additional resources to ensuring that we were able to get the funds out to the counties and also add additional capabilities and security in direct response to the pandemic and the additional difficulties it caused.

We were able to successfuly increase our security and capabilities in response to the pandemic to meet that changing environment prior to the elections. We accomplished this through internal cybersecurity improvements and capabilities as well as providing funding to the counties to accommendate changing needs due to the pandemic. We have added secure capabilites that as continued into the future will ensure that future elections continue to be secure and meet the changing needs of voters.
