We assess our performance as excellent. Washington processed 9,064,888 ballots during three elections for Federal office in 2020, under evolving pandemic conditions. This was primarily due to the equipment our subreceipients procured, as well as the additional safety measures taken, including PPE.

The most difficult issues we have faced dealing with the pandemic during a federal election include:

- · County sites are housed in small spaces
- Much of the ballot processing in the state is processed by hand
- Many people touching the same item multiple times and working side-by-side
- Small staffs and budgets have been cut because of the impacts of COVID19
- · Difficult conditions accommodating staff and observers while processing ballots
- Voters often still come in person
- Shared office space and supplies
- Envelopes that had been licked
- Difficulty obtaining PPE
- "Stay at home" orders caused long lead times and/or shortages of equipment and vendors
- · Additional response projects on top of 2020 National Federal Presidential Election, same staff
- Temporary election staff shortage
- Staff testing positive for COVID
- · Social distancing constraints and organization
- Remote working
- Tight timelines

CARES funds have significantly improved elections for Federal office by enabling our subreceipients to operate in a world changed by COVID-19. From additional equipment enabling significantly fewer employees to do the same or more work, to

more nimble and flexible operations, these changes benefited the 2020 Federal election in ways that allowed Washington to process a record setting election under pandemic conditions.

14. Lessons Learned:

Many permanent changes were made. The largest was the investment in equipment, enabling far fewer workers to process ballots for the 2020 Federal elections, which was the largest in history in terms of ballots sent and returned in Washington. This equipment also enhanced efficiency of operations saving subreceipients countless thousands of dollars during a time of declining revenue and budget shortfalls. Other permanent changes include installation of HVAC systems to heat and cool election offices and filtration systems.

We would suggest to other states that they look at ways to make operations more nimble and flexible, allowing for rapid changes due to unforeseen circumstances, whether that is from COVID-19, another pandemic, or any other emergency.
